

“RED DUST FROM OUTBACK SA - PUBLIC HEALTH CONCERN”, SAYS FILMMAKER

“70 million tonnes of radioactive tailings to be dumped at the Roxby mine site each year without evidence of dust control is cause for concern”, says Filmmaker, David Bradbury.

A vigorous front moved across South Australia for the second day last week, with west to southwest winds averaging 60-70 km/h and with damaging wind gusts in excess of 90 km/h causing grave concerns for public health with a high incidence of respiratory problems being presented to hospitals in many areas.

Fierce dust storms, which nearly blotted out Sydney, reached New Zealand. The accumulating dust built momentum as violent winds carried it across Australia, originating at Woomera in the South Australian western desert also the site of the Maralinga Nuclear bomb tests where lethal plutonium from failed cleanup attempts will stay active for a quarter of a million years. Woomera is also situated next to the BHP Billiton Olympic Dam uranium mine currently hoping to expand its operations.

Filmmaker David Bradbury speaks of concerns of dust storms from South Australian uranium mining areas impacting on the health of Australians. Academy Award nominated documentary maker

David Bradbury has spoken out, raising public concerns of the red dust dumped onto east coast cities as concerning with BHP Billiton proposing to turn South Australia's Olympic Dam uranium mine into an open-cut mine larger than Adelaide.

Minister for Mines and energy, Paul Holloway says that dust would pose a problem, which will need to be looked into at the Olympic Dam mine.

BHP Billiton have told ABC radio, they wouldn't comment “in public,” about the dust problem at the Olympic Dam uranium mine - an issue which has the potential to effect the health of the entire population of Australia.

The public are wondering with the proposed life of the mine, where the water will come from to contain radioactive tailings of such magnitude.

PRECEDENT LEGISLATION AT MINTABIE MAY ERODE CIVIL RIGHTS ACROSS AUSTRALIA

Impending SA State Legislation will see entry to Mintabie (an existing community settled prior to land grants), by ordinary Australians drastically restricted, if not totally closed off!

The draconian Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (Mintabie) Amendment Bill 2008 (and related Amendments to the Opal Mining Act 1995) is supposedly designed to put a simple town lease into State Legislation. WHY?

BECAUSE

This legislation has the potential to erode the civil rights of every Australian.

Forbidding Mintabie residents the right to drink at home, this State Legislation will also cause the Presumption of Guilt by enforcing EVERY visitor and resident to undergo Compulsory Police Checks.

And this State Legislation will add extra layers of bureaucracy (cost?) for nomads, tourists, rock-hounds and adventurers, all visitors who may be refused entry to the Mintabie Precious Stones Field in future.

The International Covenant on Civil & Political Rights states:-

Articles 12 – 1; Everyone lawfully within the territory of a State shall, within that territory, have the right to liberty of movement and freedom to choose his residence.

Article 12 – 4; No one shall be arbitrarily deprived of the right to enter his own country.

Article 14 – 7; No one shall be liable to be tried or punished again for an offence for which he has already been finally convicted or acquitted in accordance with the law and penal procedure of each country.

Article 17 – 1; No one shall be subjected to arbitrary or unlawful interference with his privacy, family, home or correspondence, nor to unlawful attacks on his honour and reputation.

Current laws are sufficient, current police numbers to enforce those laws are not sufficient.

Mr. Weatherill seems to infer that the small township of Mintabie (approx 80) is the ultimate source of the troubles on APY lands. As a resident I find this very hard to believe.

Does this mean that if the draconian and anti-civil rights draft APY-Mintabie bill {the Anangu Pitjantjatjara Yankunytjatjara (Mintabie) Amendment Bill 2008 (and

related Amendments to the Opal Mining Act 1995)} is passed, and it is then found that the troubles with alcohol and drugs continue unabated, will this legislation be repealed? continued page 7

Sampson and Delilah a film not to be missed

A FREE screening of Sampson and Delilah will take place at the Outback Open Air Cinema in Coober Pedy on Saturday 31st October 2009 – gates open 8pm and the movie will commence at 8:30pm.

Sampson and Delilah has been hailed as one of the finest films ever made in Australia, but Writer and Director Warwick Thornton thought Samson And Delilah - his debut feature about two petrol-sniffing Aboriginal teens – would struggle to get bums on seats.

"I want mainstream to see it, I want the whole of Australia to see it," he says. "If it doesn't appeal to them, well I'll jam it down their throat."

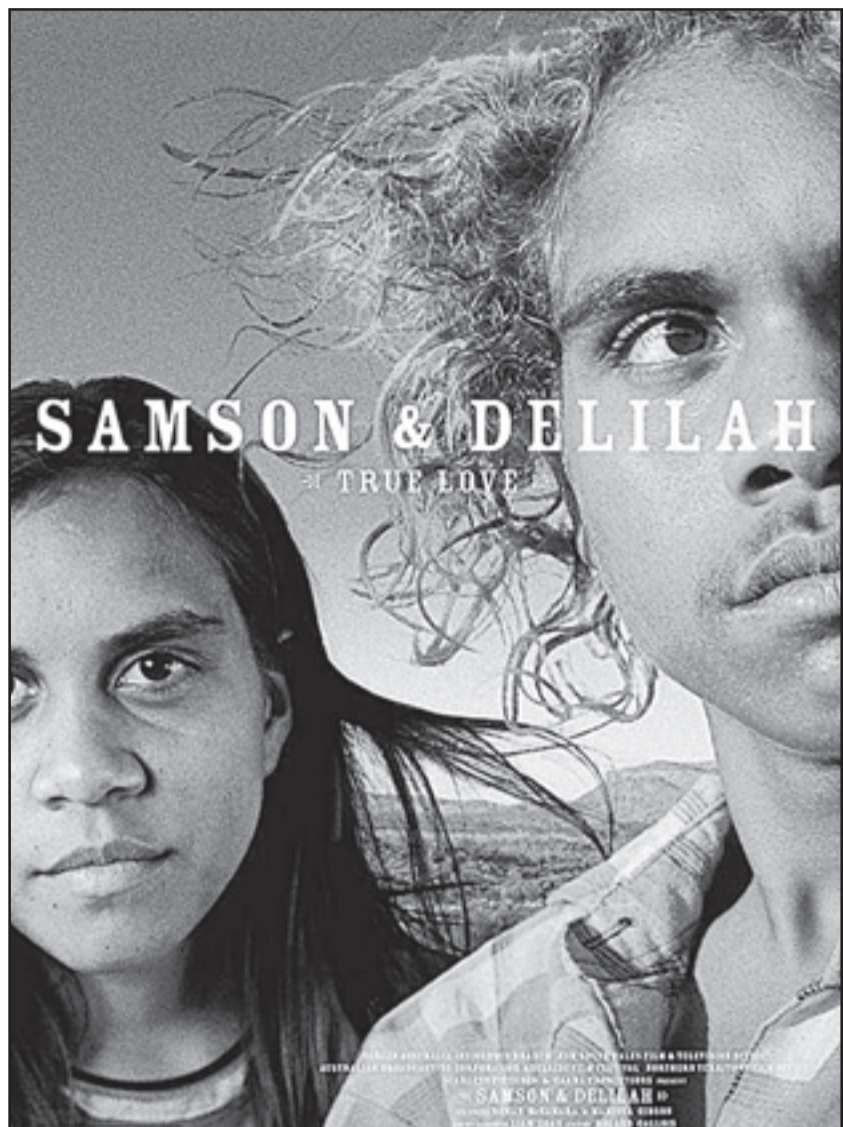
First and foremost, Sampson and Delilah is a story of teenage love. But it is also gives audiences a no holds barred look at the problems facing remote Indigenous communities - violence, substance abuse and poverty.

In the film Samson (Rowan McNamara), a cheeky 15-year-old boy, and Delilah (Marissa Gibson) live in an isolated Aboriginal community in the Central Australian desert. In amongst a tiny collection of houses, everything here happens in a cycle. Day in and day out – nothing changes, everything stays the same and no one seems to care. The two teenagers soon discover that life outside the community can be cruel. Though hungry and rejected Samson and Delilah fall in love. It is all they have. It is real. And when tragedy strikes they turn their backs on home and embark on a journey of survival. Lost, unwanted and alone they discover that life isn't always fair, but love never judges.

Writer/Director Thornton - who drew on his own experience of growing up on the streets of Alice Springs when writing the screenplay - says the accolades validate the importance of the story he's telling.

"Aboriginal kids in Alice Springs have always been touted as the problem, so I wanted to make a film about ... the reason why they become a problem," he says.

Australia's most revered film critics have called it a masterpiece. It picked up the Audience Award at the Adelaide Film Festival and opened the 2009 Message Sticks Film Festival in Sydney. From there it won the prestigious Camera d'Or (Golden Camera) award at the 2009 Cannes Film Festival. Following on in August the film was awarded the Australian Writers Guild (AWGIE) award for the Most Outstanding Australian Script of the Year and also took out the Most Original Feature Film. Finally, the film is nominated for 3 awards at the 2009 Deadly Awards including Best Female Actor,



Best Male Actor and Most Outstanding Achievement in Film. The Deadly Awards celebrations will take place at the Sydney Opera House on 15th October 2009.

Warwick Thornton was born and raised in Alice Springs. His mother, Freda Glynn, co-founded, and was the first Director of the Central Australian Aboriginal Media Association (CAAMA), and was the Director of Imparja Television for its first 10 years and, for a time, she was the only female chair of a television network in the world.

Warwick started his career as a DJ for CAAMA Radio in Alice Springs this soon led to an interest in film and he attended the Australian Film and Television Radio School (AFTRS) in Sydney. Having significant successes in short films, Sampson and Delilah is his first full length feature movie.

Following its North American premiere at the Telluride Film Festival in early September, Samson & Delilah screened at the Toronto International Film Festival mid-

September. The film opens in New Zealand in October and has been sold to France, the United Kingdom, Israel, Benelux, Colombia, the Middle East and Portugal.

At the time of writing I am informed that the event raised in the order of \$8,000.00, a great effort by everyone involved.

DOGGY DOO at Oxiana Oval - and YOU

In May of this year I included the following article in the Council News page of this paper. It is disappointing that we are still experiencing people who are not cleaning up after their dogs at Oxiana Oval.

We now have three dog waste bag dispensers at the oval, one at the entrance to the oval and one behind each set of goals, so there is no excuse not to pick up after your dog. It is not fair for other users of the oval, including small children, to have to put up with stepping in or rolling in dog faeces.

I thank those dog owners who make use of the dog waste bag dispensers to clean up after their dogs, but advise that Council will be taking steps to identify those dog owners who continue to be irresponsible and will now be prosecuting those people.

It is with disappointment that I find that some dog owners are allowing their dogs to run free on Oxiana Oval, and are also failing to clean up after their dogs. The oval is there for the use of townspeople and sporting clubs and is only a "dog off-leash exercise area" between the hours of 6.00 am and 8.00 am.

Council recently installed a dispenser at the entrance to the oval, providing a supply of bio-degradable 'doggy-doo' tidy bags for owners to pickup after their dogs. It was extremely disappointing to find that after only two

days the bags have been removed from the dispenser and were spread around the oval area.

A number of people who have used the bags as intended had discarded the bags on the walking track. These people must walk past a bin when leaving the oval's main gate.

As a dog owner it is your responsibility to clean up after your dog. Council's Animal Management Plan states that dog owners are legally required to retrieve and dispose of their dog's faeces. Council will continue to supply dog tidy bags from the dispenser at the entrance to the oval as long as this is not continually abused, and are looking into sourcing additional dog tidy bag dispensers for placement around the town. Council will also be sourcing a supply of individual degradable dog waste bags and 'pooch pouches' for sale to the public.

Please spare a thought for those people who use the oval for sport and recreation purposes when next you take your dog for a walk on the oval, and use the bags supplied to clean up after your dog and dispose of the waste in one of the many bins provided at the oval. Council does not want to get to the stage of installing a CCTV camera at the oval and prosecuting people who fail to clean up after their animals, so please do the right thing so that we can all enjoy the magnificent facilities at Oxiana Oval.

Increase in Electricity Tariffs for Coober Pedy

The District Council of Coober Pedy has been notified that there is to be a Tariff change for all Electricity Accounts. These tariffs are set by the Department of Transport Energy & Infrastructure, Energy Division. For Commercial Customers this is the first increase since 1 July 2003 and for Domestic Customers this is the first increase since 1 January 2003. The average increase for Domestic Customers will be 5%. The average increase for Commercial/Industrial Customers will be 10%.

Domestic Residential Customers

Supreme Court Decision is a Civil Rights victory for all South Australians

The United Motorcycle Council of South Australia strongly welcomes today's Supreme Court decision to throw out the Rann Government's draconian anti-association legislation and end its attack on individual rights.

UMCSA spokesman Mac Hayes said the court had recognised the danger the laws posed – not just to motorcycle clubs and their members, but to every citizen of the state.

"These laws were never about motorcycle clubs and their members," Mr Hayes said.

"They were a disgraceful attempt by the government and police to trample long-standing legal and civil rights of all citizens.

"The High Court has seen straight through the government's false claims about combating organised crime, and ruled that no government has the right to take away legal protections from its citizens."

The defeated laws gave police unfettered power to use secret, false and illegally obtained evidence against individuals, took away the right to an open and fair trial, and shut down all avenues of appeal.

They also allowed the police to pronounce individuals guilty by association, and reversed the time-honoured presumption of innocence.

"The police already have extraordinary powers to fight crime, including the ability to conduct unannounced property searches and phone taps.

"These laws were about stripping away long-standing rights from all South Australian Citizens.

"The Rann Government's draconian agenda has been exposed by the Supreme Court, and all members of the Parliament who voted for these laws should be deeply ashamed of themselves today."

"We've always said this fight could go all the way to the High Court, so we're very much prepared to take it to the next level. All South Australian patch clubs are united in this bid, and we are also receiving strong support from the wider community."

MINTABIE RESIDENTS' HEALTH IN JEOPARDY

The residents of Mintabie are becoming increasingly concerned about the lack of health care available to them. Early in the year Clinic services in the town were withdrawn with no community consultation and the RFDS who had flown into town once a month ceased this operation. While services are available at Marla, this is a 30-45 minute journey, along a very poor road and many residents do not have a vehicle able to undertake this trip. Too, there was no community consultation over the withdrawal of services and to date residents have received no clear indication as to what issues have been identified which would necessitate the removal of services. If we were informed of the issue then matters could be addressed, but this opportunity has not been provided.

Residents are even more concerned after an incident which occurred in July involving a long term member of the community, whom I will call Bob. The following is a copy of a letter I sent to both the RFDS & Frontier Services, with a copy to Country Health SA on 8th August, expressing our justifiable concerns.

I am writing this article because I have received no answer from Frontier Services as yet and one email from Community Health SA acknowledging my letter and assuring me they were looking into the matter. The RFDS has replied stating that they are satisfied with the doctor's handling of the case, but none of my questions were answered and I believe the issue needs to be publicised in order to put our concerns into the public arena. Townspeople are surely entitled to answers to these questions I put to both organisations in order to alleviate fears for their own health.

I am writing to express concerns over the recent treatment of a resident of the small community in which I live, treatment which may have an impact on other residents in the future.

Six weeks ago Bob from Mintabie, in the far north-west of South Australia was driven into the Clinic at Marla, as we no longer receive services from the clinic in the town. He was very ill and realised he would need to be transferred to a hospital down south, so brought a bag of essential supplies with him, fully expecting to be flown back on the RFDS plane, as had occurred in the past.

He was seen by the regular attending doctor, who was familiar with the patient's history of alcohol mis-use, compounded by diabetes. However, after speaking to the patient, the doctor told him that there was no point in transferring him south, no treatment was available for his condition, his liver had failed and he was to return to Mintabie, a place with no medical facilities, and there were no options! This 'advice' was witnessed by another resident of Mintabie who had transported Bob to Marla anticipating his transfer to Adelaide.

Bob was returned to his place of residence at the time – a small single room at the rear of the Mintabie Hotel, with no facilities. He was very ill, limited mobility, unable to eat without vomiting and with a very distended stomach causing him considerable pain and discomfort. Several community members took it upon themselves to assist him by helping him to shower and try to encourage him to drink fluids. After considerable concerns were expressed Clinic staff arrived in town to address a meeting of those wishing to know Bob's prognosis. At the meeting the nurses unequivocally stated that Bob was dying! There was no treatment available to him, according to both nurses, his liver had 'packed it in' and his kidneys were failing. It was only a matter of time before he died and the meeting had been called in order to assess whether the community was prepared to provide palliative care for him or whether palliative care needed to be assessed elsewhere. No other options were considered.

Bob is a Vietnam Veteran who is a full TPI with a Gold card, so treatment options because of economic concerns was not an issue.

To cut a long story short, Bob was eventually, after intervention from family and friends, sent to the Royal Adelaide Hospital where he has been treated for the past 2 weeks. He has been subjected to a variety of tests – none of which had been organised or provided for by the RFDS treating doctor in order to arrive at a definitive diagnosis. The outcome is that he has had an excess of fluid drained which has made him much more comfortable and is now able to take nourishment.

I have spoken to his medical team, at his request, who assure me that while he does have cirrhosis of the liver and some respiratory concerns he is not in need of palliative care or in danger of dying in the immediate future. He is to be transferred to a rehabilitation facility and then has been assessed as being fine to return to the community, albeit with a recommendation he resides in an area with some medical facilities.

My concerns are over the cavalier treatment of Bob. He and his family have gone through a great deal of anguish over being informed he was dying and had a very limited time to live, which has turned out to be untrue. No treatment options appear to have been offered, either to redress his medical condition or to alleviate existing problems, both of which have since been provided at the RAH.

Questions I and many in the community wish answered are:

* Why were the community and Bob all informed he was dying and that palliative care was the only option when this has been proven to be false?

* Why did the RFDS Treating doctor not transfer him to hospital when it was patently obvious Bob was very ill and had come prepared to be flown out?

* How could such a diagnosis be made with no tests being performed?

* What assurance does our community have that future patients will not be treated in a similar fashion?

I believe there needs to be some accountability provided for this patently obvious mismanagement. We live in a remote, isolated area and while residents moving to the town accept that medical facilities in such an area may be limited, most residents have settled with the understanding that a Clinic was accessible most times and in serious cases the Flying Doctor was able to land in the town in order to transport those in need to facilities able to meet their needs. Recently, this has proven not to be the case, with the loss of both the clinic and RFDS services to the township. Now, this has been compounded by the treatment of Bob, which causes a considerable amount of worry for many of our older residents who wonder if they too will be sent away to die in pain and isolation when there are actually other viable options.

I would appreciate answers to the above questions which I could share with the community. It appears to me that a serious breach of Duty of Care has occurred and while I do not wish to create dissension I believe our community deserves an explanation. I realise that by writing this letter I may be leaving myself open to animosity from those of whom I am raising concerns but I have chosen not to send this anonymously as these concerns are grave enough to be taken seriously.

In the weeks since I wrote this letter Bob has continued to receive treatment at the RAH, who are now working with Veteran's Affairs to sort out a small unit in Adelaide for him to live in, where he can access medical care if required.

It appears unlikely that health services are going to improve in the near future. As the nearest service of any kind is at the very least 30 minutes away there is a need for a First Aid post in the town, to be able to cater for minor injuries/illnesses, at least until patients can be stabilised enough to travel along a dirt road which is in very poor condition at the moment. Stations are able to purchase special medical kits with essential supplies to be used in conjunction with advice from the RFDS. We have requested the same sort of service, particularly given the fact that the rainy season will soon be upon us which can often see our one access road closed for several days. We have a Registered Nurse residing in town and several residents with a Senior First Aid Certificate who are prepared to volunteer their services on a roster system. V. Hartnett Mintabie

HEALTH CONCERNS

David Bradbury is a former ABC trained radio journalist and a respected internationally recognised filmmaker with two Oscar nominations and a host of other prizes to his credit plus broadcasting docs around the world for the last 30 years.

David who has credits of four documentaries on nuclear issues says BHP Billiton's environmental impact study which reflects that the 70 million tonnes of radioactive tailings to be dumped at the Roxby minesite each year without evidence of dust control, is alarming particularly in light of the growing cancer related illnesses across the country. "We are talking about alpha radiation which these tailings contain and are known to be carcinogenic to humans and animals", David said.

70 million tonnes per year of radioactive tailings finely pulverised into dust size particles are concerning with dust storms like this one, a frequent occurrence

David's concern is that with the open-cut mine expansion that BHP Billiton is trying to achieve permission from state and federal governments to go ahead, with radioactive tailings left behind to blow over the heavily populated cities of the rest of Australia.

Bradbury whose humanitarian work had involved raising awareness of the many harmful facets of the uranium process, says "The level of contamination brought to the surface and just dumped there by BHP Billiton every year for the life of the mine – up to 100 years – will be one of the, if not THE most environmentally criminal act of any mining company in the history of Australia".

"It is not a melodramatic statement when you know what I know of the science of it, the radical impact and triggering of cancers at low levels of radiation once they enter the body and what they do to the human (or for that matter, any species...) once in the cell and its impact on the DNA", said the filmmaker.

David continues: "This fact is not appreciated by our pollies, or the public health authorities who are behind the eight ball of what scientists without a similar voice in their media in Europe, Japan and Canada have been trying to point out for the last decade and more. We're living under a false and outdated regimen of what is considered by public health authorities to be 'a safe level of radiation' our human bodies can withstand.

The mainstream media have had the game of misinformation all stitched up in not researching and challenging that which concerns the public on the health of generations to come. The Olympic Dam expansion is a monumental disaster if allowed to go ahead and will wash over the face of Australia forever.

Those tailings are radioactive for 4.5 billion years. Most of the radioactivity in the tailings stays in the fine dust once they extract the copper, gold and uranium.

It is only 1000 kms to Melbourne as the crow flies. 1350 km to Sydney as the wind blows. And that is the direction Easterly – that the prevailing winds blow from Roxby. Seventy million tonnes each year dug out of the huge hole in the ground and dumped there for the next 100 years once they take out the valuable minerals.



Radioactive polonium, thorium, radium, bismuth, radioactive lead...and what uranium they can't finally extract is all left behind in the tailings and will be just dumped there according to BHPB's hitherto released plans for 'environmental protection'.

Those radioactive heavy metals (above) are always found in association with uranium, are not commercially viable or of any monetary use to BHP. That is why they just want to dump them at the mine's surface. Too huge a volume and people's awareness on scarcity of water such that they will not be able to dump them under water in holding dams as they do now, to leach into the surrounding water table.

Then there is the release of radon gas into the surface of the air when they mine uranium, particularly open cut mine. Radon gas released from the dug up uranium is seven times heavier than air so it does not evaporate into 'space' but hugs the earth and attaches itself to water molecules (which we or livestock or native animals drink), can be breathed into our lungs like the radioactive dust particles from the tailings thus triggering cancers and birth defects or attaches itself to growing crops and vegetation which we also eat.

Radon gas has a radioactive half life of 3.8 days (when airborne) so in that half life it can easily blow on a light wind of 20 kph to Sydney, Melbourne, Brisbane etc.

People don't even know they are breathing it in because it is odourless. So the triggering of cancers begins... which doesn't come out for 20 years or more. And how can you shaft home responsibility to the board of BHP and its CEO then who will be long gone or moved onto greener pastures in that time?

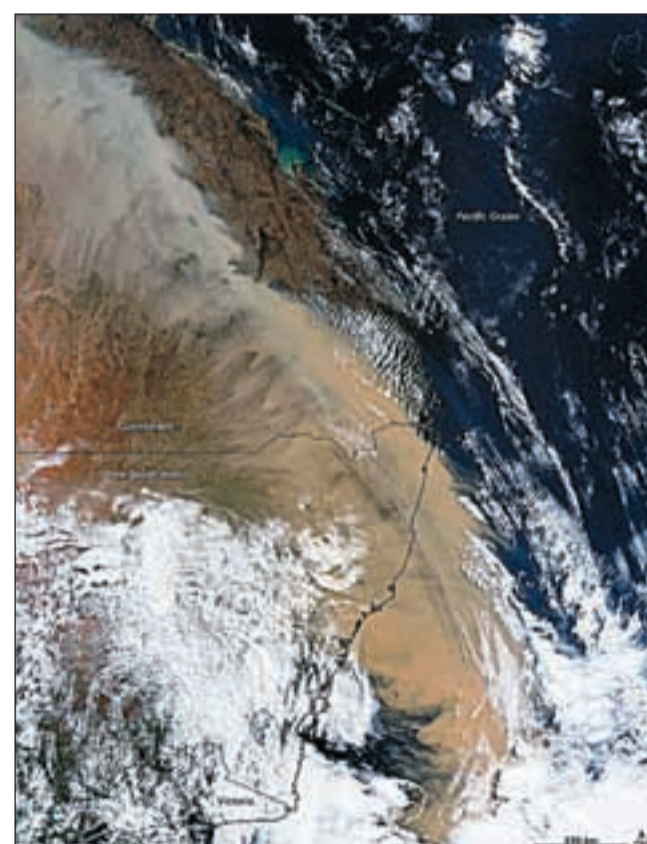
In kids radon or radioactive particles inhaled or eaten dust has a rapid impact, with maybe five years to trigger childhood or teen cancers because their cells are dividing more rapidly than adults who have stopped growing.

So the mutations in the cell from either the radioactive dust inhaled, eaten or from the radon gas alpha particle inhalation, ingestion etc precipitates the cancers faster in a child in the womb, young kids or teenagers because the cells are dividing faster and the mutated cells are created and multiply faster in the young.

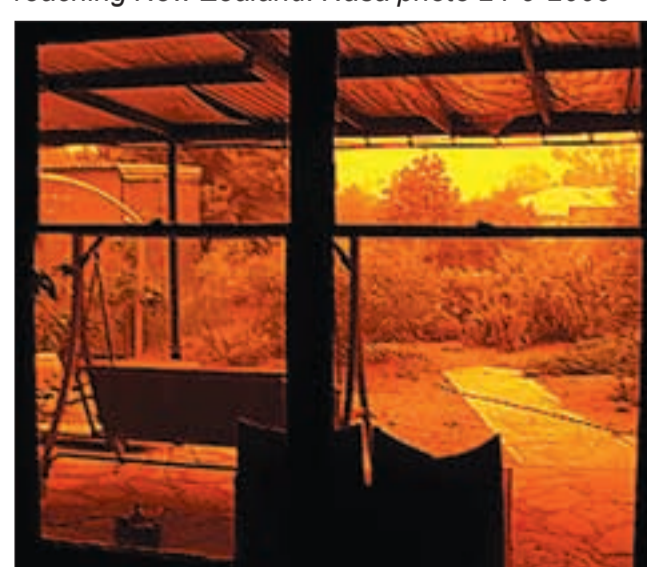
That's what cancer is – mutated cells which multiply and form tumours as a result which then take over the body and finally destroy it".

The South Australian Bureau of meteorology announced that gusts around 100 km/h have been observed at Coles Point and Woomera with a number of other locations such as Broken Hill reporting severe dust and others reporting gusts near 90 km/h.

LEIGH CREEK COAL TRAIN DERAILS ENROUTE TO PT. AUGUSTA

The Leigh Creek coal train at 3 kilometres long is the longest train in the world. The brown coal industry and the Pt. Augusta coal powered stations were still in the news on Monday, with media still broadcasting that Flinders Power had announced, that they

would not be running their coal train on the weekend in response to a Camp Climate Change protest. Nellie Malseed aged 14 who was visiting family in Copley stumbled across the derailed coal train on it's way to the Pt. August power station on Sunday.

“Is this the coal train that didn’t run”?

“As a result of Climate Camp SA 2009 emissions protest at Port Augusta, Flinders Power agreed that the longest coal train in the world would not run on Saturday or Sunday”!

At approximately 10am Sunday morning 27th September, the Leigh Creek “long coal train” traveling to the Port Augusta power station laden with coal, derailed at the safety crossing in Copley.

Local residents at Copley believed the train, enroute to Port Augusta to be 75 tonne capacity and nearly 3km long - with 16.9 metres per carriage. “That’s at least 16.779 million tonnes of the greenhouse gas – PER day, to power the uranium mines and the Port Augusta and Whyalla Industries,” a local resident calculated.

A spokesman at the scene of the derailment told on the spot reporter Nellie Malseed, that a part of the coupling broke off the coal train’s first engine and fell on to the tracks. As the second engine passed over the broken coupling, destabilising the second engine of the coal train pushing it off the tracks. There didn’t appear to be any suspicious circumstances.

A railworker spokesman told Ms Malseed that they have 3 weeks stockpile of coal at Port Augusta, so there would be no impact on power production at the power station due to the coal delivery not being made on Sunday.

A crane from Port Augusta was ordered, arriving at 7.30pm on Sunday evening to lift up and replace the engine back onto the tracks. Night lights were set up for the operation.

After a 12 hour ordeal, the coal train was back online and working again by 9.45pm allowing the crane and crew to return to Port Augusta.

A rail worker at the scene said that there was 3 weeks stockpile of coal at Port Augusta so there would be no impact on power production at the power station.

Rail workers then set about assessing the tracks and clearing broken wood and debris from the line. The distance between the lines still needed to be measured to determine if the derailment had bent the steel rails.

Fears of a derailment of the Leigh Creek long train were highlighted in the media this week after 50 Camp Climate Change protesters presented a Community Decommission Order and 350 native flowers on Saturday morning outside the Port Augusta power stations to demand that the aging, inefficient stations be closed down and replaced with renewable energy.

The power stations had been declared a “protected area” under the Protective Security Act 2007 for the period of the Climate Camp. Protesters marched two kilometres through the protected area to a point where they were stopped by 70 police including many mounted police and a canine unit.

The Camp Climate protest occurred as part of a four day climate camp where a range of workshops were held to discuss the science and politics of climate change, including the need for an immediate switch to renewable energy. A number speakers addressed the crowd at the power station.

After negotiations a small delegation of protesters were escorted by police to the actual front gates of the power station where representatives of Flinders Power failed to meet a delegation to accept the Community Decommission Order.

Participants emphasised the need for a just transition for workers in the region and that more jobs could be created in renewable energy than are currently provided by the power stations in South Australia.

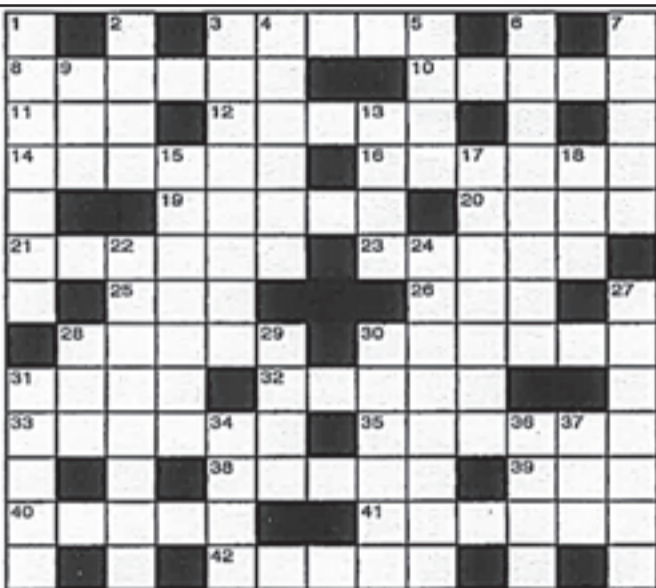

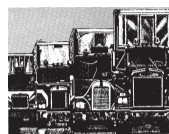

KILOMETRE LONG GOLD-CALCRETE ANOMALY FOUND NEAR CHALLENGER GOLD MINE IN SA

Located near Challenger Gold Mine in SA's far west

Summary

Ongoing ground sampling by Southern Gold Limited (ASX: "SAU") has identified a raft of new gold-in-calcrete anomalies within 15 kilometres of the producing Challenger gold mine in the far west of South Australia.

One of the anomalies is at least a kilometre in length and up to 400 metres wide and has been defined at the Nemesis Prospect, 12 kilometres north of the mine but within Southern Gold's 100% owned tenement, EL 4161.

It was identified after Southern Gold returned to the site of a promising 2006 sampling program with a more detailed 400 metre by 400 metre sampling grid that yielded a peak result of 43 parts per billion (ppb) gold within a 10ppb anomaly. The newly identified anomaly is favourably orientated in northeast alignment only 12 kilometres directly north of the Challenger mine.

Southern Gold will immediately undertake an even more intensive infill sampling program, over 200 metre by 200 metre grids to determine a first pass RAB drilling schedule for this prospect.

Southern Gold is currently prioritising and assessing more than 50 gold anomalies within its 5,000km² exploration footprint to the north and south of the million ounce Challenger mine, to bring these anomalous areas to drill ready status for 2010 drilling schedules.
