# CELEBRATING COOPER PEDY COMMUNITY CHAMPION VERONIKA WITHAM

The Community Champion Awards are hosted and sponsored by the Cooper Pedy Community Alliance, its members and supporters.

This award recognises that Veronika Witham, long term resident of Cooper Pedy, Deputy Principal of Cooper Pedy Area School, and local advocate for keeping our town and region beautiful, and so much more, has demonstrated over a long period of time, significant positive impact on this community through her commitment to service, her volunteer efforts and her fine example.

As a role model, Veronika inspires others to contribute. Highlighted is Veronika's exceptional dedication, reliability, and passion for community well-being, known to go above and beyond to improve her local area.

In accepting her Award at it's meeting on Saturday 26th April. Veronika thanked the Cooper Pedy Community Alliance for recognising and appreciating community contributions over time. "It was an honour to receive a Community Champion Award", said Veronika.

"My affiliation and love for Cooper Pedy and its amazing residents began in 1973 when my parents left Andamooka for the bigger and brighter lights of Cooper Pedy," she said.

"I began school at Cooper Pedy Area School in 1973 and completed Yr 12 in 1979. From there I worked with my father on the opal fields for about a year, before heading off to explore Australia and overseas."

Veronika actively travelled and traversed Australia; living overseas for 12 years and working in a variety of locations such as in the Pilbara region of Western Australia where she explored for alluvial gold, then became employed as a lab technician for a tomato processing company in Parkes, NSW.

She recalls living in Townsville Qld in 1982 and going to college for a year to upgrade her Yr 12 Chemistry and Maths subjects as she had aspirations to become a Geologist, (sadly didn't eventuate).

"After returning to Cooper Pedy in 1992 having spent the previous 5 years in England and Scotland Veronika began work at CPAS as a School Services Officer, (teacher's aid). I became a volunteer in the Cooper Pedy Ambulance service in the same year, and attended many critical incidents in our community and on our highway."

"Veronika recalls one afternoon in 1993, "I was sitting at my friends' house having coffee when my beeper went off. I called in to get the job description and was told there had been a school bus rollover on the William Creek Road, a considerable distance from Cooper Pedy.

My adrenalin kicked in at the thought of injured children as I raced to the hospital to prepare the ambulance."

The scale and immensity of this tragedy in which one young girl was killed and many others seriously injured was more than Veronika could take and following this accident, she resigned from the service.

Fellow Emergency Services volunteer Andy Sheils ESM of the Cooper Pedy Mine Rescue Squad recalls that horrific event, but moreso that Veronika excelled in her duty as a Volunteer Ambulance Officer and did her team proud.

"Besides being relatively new to the Ambulance Service and like all of us confronted by the scene, Veronika's training cut in and she soon assessed which casualties needed immediate help and first aid," Andy told us.

In 1996 Veronika began external study towards a teaching degree whilst working as an SSO and raising her son Luke, then finally receiving her Bachelor of Education qualification in 2002.

Veronika began work as a teacher at CPAS in 2003, teaching for two years before moving to Port Lincoln in 2005 where she spent the next ten years in the corporate sector of education as a Project Officer recruiting mentor volunteers into schools.

Veronika packed a lot into her experience working in schools across South Australia's Eyre Peninsula, including the position of Attendance Officer who's primarily responsibility is to promote and maintain high attendance rates among students.

Her last stint away, was 6 years as a Behaviour Coach. Then in 2016, Veronika returned to Cooper Pedy to work as a relief teacher whilst she cared for her father.

Following on from her return 'home', in 2017 she won the position of Senior Leader in Intervention at CPAS. Then between 2018-2020 she returned to her role as Behaviour Coach based in Cooper Pedy and working in Far North schools including Andamooka and Roxby Downs.

In 2021 Veronika won a 3 year position as Assistant Principal of the Cooper Pedy Area School, (a very proud moment). Last year in 2024 Veronika 2024 applied for and won the Deputy Principal role, which remains her current position today.

Veronika said she enjoys working with the young people in our community, endeavoring to be a positive role model to highlight that no matter where you come from and how long it takes, you can eventually succeed in achieving your life goals.

"In amongst all of that I have worked as a Dental assistant, hairdresser's assistant, spent years in the hospitality trade (waitress at the Old Acropolis restaurant in 1980), worked as a cleaner in schools and hospitals, worked in retail etc", said Veronika.

And those of us who have walked and worked alongside Veronika will know that in our history here at Cooper Pedy, she has volunteered on a number of committees including, Secretary for Rate Payers Association, Member of Historical Society, member of Hospital Advisory Committee, School Governing council and currently Child Safeguarding person for Catholic Parish.

"Growing up in Cooper Pedy taught me to be tough, resilient and to never give up. It provided the right opportunities at the right time, taught me to understand people from all cultures and walks of life and taught me that life is too short to waste time and harbour grudges", she said.

"I am definitely a child of Cooper Pedy and it definitely runs through my blood..." she said.

The CPRT newspaper first became DIGITAL/ ONLINE in 2006 as well as hardcopy. Although online is now the main trend, hard copies are still printed locally.



# FOSSICKING FOR OPAL

## The Rules

### Fossicking Definition

Fossicking means the gathering of precious stones (opal) as a recreation, or without the intention to sell the stones or to utilise them for a commercial or industrial purpose. Note: Does not include gathering precious stones through disturbance of land by machinery or explosives.

Opal Fields are no place for children!



Dangers are everywhere, a child's safety will be placed at risk!

- Open mine shafts / exploration drill holes,
  - Unstable ground, undercut shaft edges and deep trenches,
  - Explosions,
  - Mobile plant and operating machinery, and
  - Snakes and insects.
- Falling into a mine shaft, deep trench or open cut pit, can will sustain serious injuries or death!
- Personal Protective Equipment and Supplies
- It can reach temperatures of up to 50 degrees during summer months, and the following is recommended:
- Apply 50+ rating sunscreen to protect exposed skin from the sun's UV radiation,
  - Wear a broadbrim hat, strong lightweight clothing, gloves and enclosed footwear, and
  - Wear a P2 Dust mask / respirator when generating dust to prevent possible exposure to respirable crystalline silica.
  - Carry enough cool drinking water and fuel for the trip.
- Note: Camping is illegal on South Australian opal fields!

### Communications

- When fossicking alone:
- Tell someone where (location) you are going,
  - Have communications (phone, two way radio etc...) to regularly check in, and
  - Ensure your contact person knows what to do if you don't check in!



### Accessing Opal Fields - Know your Location!



- Use a GPS, compass, or take pictures of locations or ground markings to ensure you know the right way out of the areas,
  - Recommend having a 3m flexible flag (orange) or an amber flashing light to make vehicle visible, and
  - Drive slow, look for traffic and drive to conditions,
- Note: Mine shafts are everywhere, keep eyes open!

### Hidden Dangers!




### Look where you place your feet, and never walk backwards!

Mine shafts can be covered with sheets of corrugated iron or thin metal mesh, spinifex, mullock heap spoil and other materials which can hide the dangers. Stepping on these areas, can result in the material / ground collapsing, and a person falling down a mine shaft. It is recommended to:

- Use a thin long steel rod or piece of wood to test the ground in front of you when walking around the base of a heap.
- Listening for metal on metal type sounds when taping / pushing into the material, is a good way to identify these hazards.

### Identifying a Registered Claim



A registered claim can be identified by:

- A post on each corner of the claim with a permit number attached to the post.
- Each posts must be at least 70 mm thick and stand at least 0.750 m above the surface of the ground.
- Posts must be knocked securely into the ground and have indicator arms on the outer sides of the post to show the direction and clearly identify the claim boundary.

It is an offence for fossickers to enter or remain on land comprised in a claim without obtaining the permission of the owner of the claim

### Dangerous Ground

Dangerous ground is an area of ground (mine shafts, tunnels, open pits, faces etc...) that has been deemed unsafe to access, fossick or mine by the Department for Energy and Mining, because it has either collapsed, or has the potential to collapse. Dangerous ground can be identified by a "Danger - Unsafe Ground, No Mining Permitted" sign, or by Red Post Markers knocked into the ground. Accessing or mining dangerous ground is prohibited without approval from SafeWork SA.



### Identifying Unsafe Ground

- Signs of potentially unsafe ground conditions are, but not limited to:
- Sunken ground, cracked / split ground,
  - Open voids, and
  - Weathered / eroded shaft edges

### Fossicking

Fossickers are warned against entering old open cut and underground workings as many dangers may exist!



- Fossicking can only take place to a maximum depth of 1 metre,
  - All holes must be refilled,
  - Unstable ground, stale air and lack of oxygen,
  - Unprotected openings and water filled holes,
  - Fossicking into sides of excavations may cause a cave in,
  - Large stockpiles may collapse unexpectedly if undercut.
- Note: Seek assistance of experienced and competent miners to assist before entering old mines!

### Caldwell Drill Holes and Exploration holes

Do not stand too close to an edge of a mine shaft! Rains can erode and undercut the ground around the top edge of a mine shaft, whilst still giving the appearance of solid ground. When weight is placed on the ground around the edge of the shaft, the ground can give away and collapse!

### Mullock Heaps



Mullock heaps are mounds of material that have been dug from a mine shaft and underground, and are generally known as waste material, and can be very slippery to climb.

Mine shafts are located at the bases of a heaps. When climbing, a loss of footing could result in a person sliding to the bottom of the heap, into a mine shaft resulting in serious injury or death.

Always climb a heap on the opposite side to a mine shaft opening, and always take a bucket of material from a heap and search through it on stable, safe ground.

## Opal Mining Act 1995

### Part 3—Precious stones tenements

#### 25—Unlawful entry on tenement

(1) A person must not, without lawful authority or excuse, enter or remain on land comprised in a registered precious stones tenement without first obtaining the permission of the holder of the tenement.



**Maximum Penalty:**

**\$10,000.**

### FIRST AID & EMERGENCY

Be prepared for minor first aid injuries or emergency situations while fossicking in the opal fields.

Snakes are all too common in these areas, they can be found in shafts and holes, or curled up under a bush or a piece of tin.

The "inland taipan" and the "brown snake" are extremely poisonous and will attack if they feel threatened.

Ensure your first aid kit has a snake bite kit in it and familiarise with the requirements for first aid treatment of a snake bite,

It is recommended at a minimum, that the following is carried in a vehicle at all times whilst in the opal fields:

- A small first aid kit, and snake bite kit, and
  - List of emergency contact numbers

# COOBER PEDY'S PUBLIC SERVICE SHOULD BE ASHAMED.

## Those who adopted the Australian life, and are now denied!

On the 27th of April 2025 Arthur Makris age 86, a long term resident of Coober Pedy of 50 years was forced to leave Coober Pedy in fear of his life, due to uncontrolled, ongoing crime in the town. In our view he was neglected by the Federal, State and Local Government Public Servants.

Arthur moved to Coober Pedy with his wife Maria and three children in 1978. He opened up his own business a Greek Kafeneo on the Main street, with all the single male and ethnic opal miners around at the time, it flourished.

Arthur's wife Maria worked with Sergio at the Opal inn, then owned by the Coro family. Sergio would prepare international quality cuisine for the community and tourists. Arthur's children went to school, and in turn they worked and raised their children in Coober Pedy.

His family gave back to the community in many ways, from Arthur playing in a Greek Band to raise money for the Greek Hall to his children contributing to the organising of competitive sports, the Greek Orthodox Community Club and other community clubs, local government and prominent contributions through their work endeavours.

Arthur's wife suffered from early onset of dementia in her early 60's warranting nursing home care. However, Arthur stayed true to his culture and traditions and refused to place Maria in care. He cared for her at home with minimal formal and informal supports for close to 15 years until her passing. Arthur didn't rely on the public servants then; he took on his carers role with love and determination.

Post his wife's passing close to 20 years ago, he has survived the isolation with his few Greek friends that were still alive and living in Coober Pedy. They would get together he would play Greek songs on his guitar and remember the good old days.

Arthur's safety net and community started unhinging as his cronies got older. Many were assaulted and forced to relocate to Adelaide, many relocated in fear, not by choice. One such gentleman was hurried out of his home after a robbery and an assault and relocated to a location in Adelaide unfamiliar to him. He died the following day. His family to this day are blaming 'the system'.

There are only a few older people from his cultural group living in Coober Pedy now, the rest have been neglected, mistreated; had their human rights diminished and have either passed or been forced to leave Coober Pedy

Those brave pioneers that escaped from troubled European situations to have a new life in the "lucky country" and committed themselves to the Australian way of life, now feel betrayed.

Arthur suffered three home invasions in 2 months, whilst asleep in his home; no concern demonstrated by the leaders at DCCP in respect to their responsibility to community safety, in fact they state they have no responsibility to community safety. A concerned discussion with the local police or better still the Police Minister did not occur.

No emergency responses to 000 calls, it took Coober Pedy Police 4 hours to attend Arthur's property. Aged care services are substandard and rarely accessible; unethical and unconscionable, is our observation.

Arthur never accepted the options tabled by his adult children around residing with one of them in Adelaide or Melbourne; he was very firm around that. Arthur wanted to die in Coober Pedy, where his wife is buried so he can rest by her side.

This dream of Arthur's ended on the 27th of April when he was rescued by his two daughters and grandson and relocated to a safer space. We adopted your culture Australia, and now we are denied.

It cannot be fathomed by Arthur and his family how a town with so many beautiful memories and blessed times, and a country they have called their home for most of their lives has become so toxic toward its elderly.

There are still some kind caring community people left in Coober Pedy, who came to assist and support Arthur. However, they are not public servants, so where are the workers that we fund with our taxes and why aren't they meeting the ever evolving needs of the community that provides them with financial support?

Arthur's daughter (above left) Julia Papillo went to high school in Coober Pedy and worked for TAFE and as a receptionist at the Opal Inn until she met her husband who is Robert Coros first cousin (he was visiting his family from Adelaide), she left Coober Pedy in the late 80's got married and has 2 daughters. Julia was prominent in sports, organising competitions and playing basketball and netball.

Arthur's son Louie Makris, (not present) went to primary school and high school in Coober Pedy and trained as a motor mechanic at Kypso's garage in the 80's and 90's. He then worked with Yanni Pandelli in the Miners store hardware and also as an opal miner.

Louie married a Coober Pedy girl, and they now have a daughter and a son. They moved to Adelaide in the late early 2000's. Louie was active in all competitive sports and volunteering as a committee member for many years with the Greek Orthodox Community Club.

Katrina moved to Coober Pedy when she was 17 and had just deferred from Adelaide University. She commenced work at the Bank of NSW, married a Coober Pedian when she turned 21 and within 3 years had a son and a daughter. Katrina was always volunteering, in competitive sports and the community clubs. In the late 80's she commenced working for the Department of Community Welfare as a Community Support Worker progressing to a senior status running community development projects for the Department. Katrina served as a councillor and Deputy Mayor for a period of 4 years and relocated to Melbourne in 2000.

Since Arthur began living in fear with the ongoing home invasions, the primary responsibility sat with Katrina, her son John Andrea and sister Julia. They all work full time, and spent many hours in a day responding to his crisis and having to navigate the service system in Adelaide where he is not deemed to be an Adelaidean, he is a Coober Pedian. They all took time away from their families and work to travel to Coober Pedy twice over the past 3 months to rescue Arthur who had fallen through the holes in the system.

"The public service practice framework in Coober Pedy in our view is unconscionable; SHAME! Stand up and protest Coober Pedians; the time is right, the time is now, do not accept any violations of your basic human right to safety", said Katrina.

# Plea for safer behaviour with National Road Safety Week

The State Government is pleading for people to be safer on our roads as National Road Safety Week begins.

**Already this year 29 lives have been lost on our roads.**

The State Government has released a comprehensive new Road Safety Action Plan to reduce lives lost by 50 per cent and serious injuries by 30 per cent by 2031.

This includes the introduction of time-based 40km/h zones at priority sites near schools to protect some of the state's most vulnerable road users with these to be progressively implemented from mid-2025.

Another key prevention measure has been the introduction of mobile phone detection cameras to reduce road trauma caused by driver distraction.

Latest data shows the mobile phone detection cameras have been effective, with the number of drivers caught using their mobile phone dropping by 86% at locations where new cameras have been introduced.

Several other important road safety initiatives were recently implemented, including:

- New licensing requirements for drivers of ultra-high powered vehicles
- Release of a Road Safety at Work guide to support organisations embed a culture of road safety in the workplace
- Enhancements to the Rider Safe program for novice motorbike riders
- New online Hazard Perception Test

During National Road Safety Week, SA Police will be running Operation Danger, which focuses on dangerous road use offences including following too close, disobeying traffic lights and dangerously changing lanes.

The RAA will launch a new regional road safety program of community Town Hall events for local road users to share their experiences on what can be done to reduce the overrepresentation of lives lost on regional roads.

Stephen Mullighan MP said, "Reducing the lives lost and serious injuries on South Australia's roads is a top priority for this Government.

**Every road death or serious injury is a tragedy and has an impact on families, friends, communities and the emergency service personnel who respond to incidents or work to save lives.**

The Government launched its new Road Safety Action Plan earlier this year to improve safety on our roads, which includes important initiatives such as reducing speed limits near schools.

Superintendent Shane Johnson, SA Police Traffic Services Branch Officer in Charge ,said, "Today, and every day, South Australia Police does our part in making roads across Australia safe - and we urge all road users to do the same throughout National Road Safety Week,

Throughout National Road Safety Week, police will conduct Operation Danger, which targets easily avoidable offences and if drivers obey them, they're less likely to cause a crash.

Road users should simply make safe road choices and drive to survive. Give each other space between vehicles, check your blind spots and slow down as you approach intersection."

# STEVE KONCZ & THE PEARL-OPAL STORY



**Pearlopals are opals seeded into a pearlshell and put back in the sea for 12-18 months**

**The "Pearl-Opal" Story began with an idea..**

In 1999, **Steve Koncz**, an opal cutter, wholesaler and "out of the box" thinker, dreamed up an idea to seed pearl oysters with Australian boulder opals and let them grow together. He calls his new gems, "Pearlopal".

After the idea was born, it took 8 years of trial and error before the first successful commercial harvest of Pearlopal. Various attempts at Australian pearl farms were performed.

Steve was persistent in discovering what modifications were necessary for the shells to accept the opals.

**Australian Boulder Opal.** Each one of these boulder opals (pictured above) has spent 1 year in the ocean whilst the mollusk has grown mother of pearl around the stone. Sometimes there is a bezel of gold around the stone which was also in the water for this time.

Many problems can arise, such as cyclones, whales tangling the lines holding the shells, disappearing shells (through no fault of the pearl farmers) The opal inserts themselves even had to undergo modification several times before the shells would accept them.

**The production of Pearlopal is truly a case of "Desert meets the ocean".**

To explain more about the process, firstly the opal miner digs the opal from underground where it has taken millions of years to form, then the opal is passed on to an opal cutter who carefully shapes and polishes it - bringing out its magnificent colours...

The opal is specially prepared for its insertion into the pearl shell... The preparation involves 3 separate steps that have to be just right, if the preparation is not exactly right the shell will die.

The pearl-shell is then gently coaxed open. It can't be forced as the stress would kill it, so they are only opened about 2cm, then a technician skilfully inserts the opal (sometimes with gold setting around it).

The pearl-shell is then rested and returned to the ocean. Once there, it has to be regularly cleaned to prevent marine growths and worms from causing harm.

Once the pieces are processed they are taken to our jewelers and further skilled work is done to set them, mostly in pendants using 18ct. gold.

Pearlopal is currently being made in Australia. This pristine area is the ideal home for the creation of this new gem.

We have so far achieved up to 100% success rate with seeding, which is indeed rare.

We thank Steve for sharing his story with us and we continue to thank him for his generous donation of Pearlopals to the Coober Pedy Community Alliance to raffle for a good cause.

### **Some current concerns and considerations by members of the Coober Pedy Community**

**Q. 1 I do not like the 'master plan' Q. 2) These are my reasons.**

- This project appears to have no direct benefit to the ratepayers and their families.
- For the amount of funding required, and the obvious amount of maintenance and ongoing costs to upkeep this 'Urban-Style Facility has not been identified. Why? With a dwindling population, the costs would be born by fewer ratepayers.
- The project is not economically viable. Why wasn't a feasibility study done on this particular plan? It will not have many if any, original elements of our history or community useability remaining in the new purpose and design.
- Why wasn't the Heritage aspect of our frontier-style outback mining town considered? How and when was there a decision made to convert our community's heritage asset into an urban-style "attraction" for tourists and potential filmmakers? There is likely to be fallout from this, if approved.
- In all fairness, rather than this rushed, almost inconvenient consultation of sorts, why wasn't an independent Socio-Economic Study done to assess the potential social and economic consequences of a proposed development or change in other status'.
- Isn't it the Council's responsibility to properly understand both the benefits and harms, and the range of impacts on community, businesses, and individuals? An independent Socio-Economic Study exists to aid councils in informed decision-making, identifying mitigation strategies, and maximising positive impacts while minimising negative ones.
- Alternatively, what is the rush? Coober Pedy is over 100 years old as an opal mining town. Why not wait until our community has a democratically elected council again, and we are able to discuss and decide under more appropriate circumstances.
- We ask this current council to focus on reducing the debt, not increasing it and creating ongoing hardship for the ratepayers and new people looking to buy homes, who are unwittingly inheriting council's debt.

**Letter below:** In light of increasing costs being imposed upon Coober Pedy's Ratepayers, being businesses and all property owners, George Kountouris, Chair of the Coober Pedy Retail, Business and Tourism Association has written to the State Government asking them to release information on reckless and irresponsible spending of our money and resources in areas that are unproductive and for the most part, bears no relevance to our remote communities dire needs for survival. This includes Council's overuse of "consultants". The Council has already admitted to not being able to pay its debts hence all assets in the town are mortgaged. (If the council was a private company, it would be called TRADING INSOLVENT.)

Dear Minister,

I enclose a circulated request addressed to you and other appointed personnel of the District Council of Coober Pedy (non-elected).

Many residents of Coober Pedy are seeking information, clarity, and the rationale behind your department's and the Malinauskas Government's continued backing of Consultant Michael Edgecomb, and the social engineering of our town's political and community structure through the "Together Group."

While we understand it was the previous Marshall Government that dismissed our elected councillors and installed administrators, you and the Malinauskas Government have pursued and allowed the funding of a person not formally qualified to act as our Mayor, and watch him assume an emperor-like presence within the Coober Pedy Council, while being paid out of funds that are allocated predominantly for municipal and essential services for the Ratepayers and Residents and our environment.

Many of us would like answers to the following important questions:

- What have been Mr Edgecomb's various annual salaries?
- Have the council paid vehicle, travel, accommodation, meals or other - past and present?
- Why are these arrangements not publicly documented and disclosed?
- Is he paid by the hour or day or upon invoice? If invoice how is the information verified?
- Does he have an office within the Council Chambers?
- Was and is his position advertised and tendered in accordance with local government procurement processes?
- From whom does he take instruction — the appointed (non-elected) Council, the Malinauskas Government, or the Governor General?
- Have you agreed to him and his group of 2,3 or currently 7 representing the 1,700 residents of Coober Pedy?
- Were you or your department satisfied with dealing with an unincorporated entity, and were you aware of the risks involved in outsourcing tasks to such a body?
- Why was Mr Edgecomb permitted to sit on the interview selection panel for the appointment of the last CEO, Garry Herdegen?
- Was this done with your knowledge? Given there are strict rules on the appointment of senior local government positions, was this not a violation of the Local Government Act, which requires qualified personnel to oversee such appointments?
- How much of Mr Edgecomb's paid consulting and advising work — both in Coober Pedy and in Adelaide — are you aware of?
- How much of the \$30,000 consultancy fee allocated for the Drive-In project did he receive, either directly or indirectly?

- When were these funds paid, to whom, and from what source?
- Can we please view a full breakdown of these costings?
- Were there any other tenders for the insurance-funded Drive-In repair work, if so, how many and what was the process? Who sat on that selection process?
- Regarding the current proposal for the Coober Pedy Drive-In: According to the Council minutes, your appointed Administrative Council agreed to the proposal (via Mr Edgecomb) before public consultation had even occurred. Why were none of the 10 other major local associations consulted beforehand?
- Additionally, can you clarify the exact role and legal authority of the Administrative Council?
- Has the Local Government Act been disregarded on the basis that
- Coober Pedy has no elected representation?
- We are concerned that most Malinauskas Government departments are now treating the Coober Pedy Together group as the primary point of contact for the town. Are you aware of the advice and actions being taken in your name?
- Is it truly your and your department's strategy to "dumb down"
- this community by using a small, unelected group to govern the majority?

We unitedly and strongly object to an unqualified individual — with no expertise in tourism, business, opal mining, retail, or civil governance — acting as our representative, especially when financed by our hard-earned money and backed by a complacent Department for Local Government.

Accordingly, we respectfully request your presence in Coober Pedy for a public town meeting, where you can personally answer these questions and address many other serious concerns that exist within our community. Your last visit once again resulted in consultants being engaged to assess our town, with no reported outcomes.

The majority of Coober Pedy residents remain passionate, committed, and ready to contribute to the wellbeing of our town. However, the last time North Terrace was involved in Coober Pedy we had a catastrophic EDL deal with resulted in the Ombudsman deeming the process as one of the worst cases of maladministration in the history of ICAC, and yet nobody was charged, rendering our council unfit for re-election for years to come.

Please respond to our questions in writing and confirm your availability for a town meeting. We believe this meeting would also benefit from the attendance of both local and Adelaide media.

Written submissions that address issues outside the terms of reference may not be accepted. Unless determined otherwise by the Committee, submissions are made publicly available on the internet.



## Life cycle of illegal tobacco



Organised crime syndicates plough the land, ready to plant tobacco seedlings.



Seedlings take 2 to 3 months to grow into mature tobacco plants.



Mature tobacco plants are large and leafy and many have long, trumpet-shaped, white-pinkish flowers.



Harvested tobacco leaves are dried in a kiln and then cut and sold as loose tobacco, otherwise known as 'chop-chop'.

## Would you recognise a tobacco plant?

- 2.5 metres tall
- Large green leaves
- Long trumpet-shaped, white-pinkish flowers
- May resemble kale, cabbage or corn.

## Signs of an illegal growing operation

- Intense labour production between November and May
- People approaching real estate agents, landowners or farmers to lease land
- Unusual earthworks along creeks and rivers
- Unexplained and potentially unlawful use of water resources
- An unexplained strong tobacco odour
- Unusual source of loose tobacco.

## ATO partnerships

The ATO is part of the Illicit Tobacco Taskforce (ITTF), which was established on 1 July 2018 to detect, disrupt and dismantle serious organised crime syndicates that deal in illicit tobacco.

## STRONGER DOMESTIC STRANGULATION LAWS BEGIN

Reforms to strengthen South Australia’s domestic violence laws have now come into effect, giving prosecuting authorities greater scope to charge and secure a conviction against domestic violence perpetrators for the offence of domestic strangulation.

The legislative changes were developed in response to a review into the domestic strangulation offence which found that charges and prosecution rates of the offence were low.

The review also found there was a lack of clarity around the evidence required to prove the offence in court.

The reforms, which have come into effect this month, include a clearer and expanded definition of choking or strangling a person, as well as a new higher-penalty offence for cases where someone is rendered unconscious due to choking or strangulation in a domestic setting.

Under the new laws, choking or strangling is now defined as the applying of pressure to a person’s neck to an extent that is capable of affecting their breath or flow of blood to the head. This revised definition replaces the previous definition which required proof that the victim’s breathing had been restricted, but did not acknowledge the impact of strangulation on blood flow to the head, which can have even more dangerous and lasting impacts on the victim.

**Where an individual is rendered unconscious due to strangulation or choking in a domestic setting, the offender could face up to ten years in jail if convicted under this new offence.**

Kyam Maher said, "Strangulation or choking is widely recognised as a precursor to domestic homicide, which is why it is so important that we have clear, comprehensive laws that give prosecuting authorities the ability to act."

"Ensuring the threshold required to prove the offence is set at a more realistic level – and ensuring there is a clear, easily understood definition of what the offence entails – is essential if we are to treat this offence with the gravity it deserves."

"These important reforms will help us get tough on domestic violence offenders before their actions have even more devastating consequences."
