LOCAL MEMBER FOR STUART, GEOFF BROCK CONDUCTS "LISTENING POSTS" AT COOBER PEDY

Saturday 1st and Sunday 2nd November saw Local Member for the Seat of Stuart Geoff Brock MP set up a pop up office and hold "listening post" meetings with local residents at Coober Pedy.

Geoff's aim is to refamiliarise himself with Coober Pedy, and guage the tone of the town in terms of satisfaction, and or concerns that may need a broader focus, and let people know what the role of Local Member will involve next year for whoever claims the Seat of Stuart.

As we are now aware, at the 2026 State elections in March, Coober Pedy will be in the Seat of Stuart (not Giles) where Geoff is currently the local member. It is quite normal that the Candidates for that Seat will want to get to know, or refresh themselves with the areas and towns that will come into that jurisdiction.

Saturday for Geoff was a busy day starting off with breakfast at Outback Bar & Grill, and then the Listening Posts meetings, with almost 'wall to wall' appointments of locals asking questions, getting clarification on a variety of concerns and taking advantage of Geoff being a current Member of Parliament. The day finished off with dinner at John's Pizza Bar.

Geoff then met with the Coober Pedy Community Alliance who represent around 170 local residents and ratepayers to discuss issues brought to them by members. Geoff said that he was very keen to help ensure that Coober Pedy was returned to a democratic structure as soon as possible.

Geoff and the Alliance Group then enjoyed dinner at Coober Pedy RSL where Geoff was able to catch up with others.

Geoff spoke highly of his visit to Coober Pedy. "In early November I had the pleasure of spending two days in Coober Pedy, and I must say it was a truly enriching experience. Sitting down and speaking one-on-one with local residents gave me valuable insight into the unique challenges and opportunities facing the community".



ADDRESSING "MISLEADING" ADVICE ABOUT OPAL ON SOCIAL MEDIA



Dear Editor,

It has come to our attention that a particular online seller on Facebook has made, in our opinion, mischievous and misleading statements during a live stream to the public on Sunday 02 November 2025. We believe these comments have the potential to be very damaging for the Coober Pedy Opal Industry

We have extracted a few comments made during the live stream which are;

Quote 1 -Some of the Opal fields in Coober Pedy and Lightning Ridge (but mostly Coober Pedy) have unstable and cracky opal and he highly suggests not to buy opal from specific fields. Stating, that after cutting, a year later the stones will crack and or explode.

To put a blanket over certain fields is completely incorrect and misleading. These parameters are surely imaginary? High quality and stable opal along with faulty opal can be found in any field. There are multiple factors surrounding what might cause faulty opals. I.e. explosive blasting, opal level depth, matrix or rock on the opal, opal in or on gypsum, formation etc. There are many more factors why some opal may not be gem quality. If opal is found to have cracks, natural or circumstantial, those pieces can generally be used to make triplets. This knowledge comes with experience.

Quote 2-White based opal is crap and suggests its being sold at an inflated price.

All opals are beautiful and valuable. Opal colours and patterns are a personal choice. Coober Pedy is famous for white based opal along with crystal and black opal.

We can only hope that the particular online seller does a better job in the future with educating their clients with facts, and supporting the industry that supports them.

The Birdsville Track and Cooper Creek - Heavy Vehicle Barge Official Opening, Connecting the Outback, with Geoff Brock MP

"On Wednesday 5 November 2025 I had the privilege of attending the official opening of the new Cooper Creek Barge - a vital piece of infrastructure that will make a real difference for our pastoralists, freight operators, and remote communities", reports Geoff Brock MP from the Cooper Creek

"After months of isolation caused by record flooding, this \$27.4 million investment, jointly funded by the State and Federal Governments, is now reconnecting the Birdsville Track, a lifeline for South Australia's cattle industry and outback tourism."

"The vast floodwaters covered over 32,000 square kilometres, nearly half the size of Tasmania, cutting off access to processors and stranding well in excess of 20k head of cattle."

"The new barge, the largest of its kind in South Australia, can carry fully loaded A-double trucks up to 36.5 metres long, transporting up to 160 cattle per trip. It's a game-changer for livestock transport and essential services."

"Standing beside the mighty Cooper Creek and seeing the sheer scale of the water, I couldn't help but reflect on the legacy of the MV Tom Brennan, the very first barge built in 1949 to serve this crossing. That humble steel punt, powered by a 4hp outboard motor, was a lifeline for drovers and mail contractors like Tom Kruse. It served faithfully for over a decade before being replaced by a small barge capable of carrying a single car, and now, more than 60 years later, we welcome a new chapter."



- A genuinely funded State-Federal taskforce for Coober Pedy to deliver:
- Upgraded water and electricity infrastructure, and transparency by the State Government on costs, timelines and subsidies.
- Restoration of elected local government in Coober Pedy as soon as feasible, the community must have a voice.
- Commonwealth funding tied to training and employment programs in the town: ensuring that local youth can access trade training, opal cutting, tourism operations and other local-industry opportunities.
- Secure air services and upgrade of the airport to maintain connectivity, plus targeted support for outback roads to keep station access viable and local pastoralists and businesses open.
- Strengthening volunteer and emergency services in Coober Pedy: recruitment pathways, incentives and dedicated funding to retain essential personnel for police, ambulance and mfs.
- A clear plan to hold the State Government to account for the delays, particularly the financial plan to exit council administration and the water-infrastructure strategy. The community must know the timelines and details.
- A fairer cost base for residents: remote living should not equate to paying three times more for water or being subject to utility practices deemed unjust by the Ombudsman.

Coober Pedy is more than just a tourist town; it's a regional Australian icon doing its best in a tough environment. It's a symbol of what happens when remote communities fall between the cracks: high costs, declining services, community fatigue, and decline.



Tom Venning MP after meeting with the people of Coober Pedy, delivered a speech in Federal Parliament relating the community fatigue experienced and the current state of the essential services assets after nearly 8 unproductive years in Administration.

The community welcomed Tom Venning and Liberal Candidate for Stuart Leon Stephens, and are feeling hopeful of Federal support, after years of autocratic style rule and zero progress. Heavily invested locals are concerned for the future of the opal mining town in the hands of inexperienced FIFO operators who prefer to keep the community at a

"This is a great town, the hospitality on this trip has been so warm. I would hate for a series of bad decisions by government to result in that great soul being stripped away."

Leon Stephens, Candidate for Stuart said, "We aren't just here for a photo-op. We are committed to taking Coober Pedy's fight to Adelaide and Canberra to force a real plan, not another raft of reviews."

"People here are so resilient, they are dealing with something they do not deserve. There are great opportunities for exporting opals, some of the best people in the world are here to teach young locals about presentation and grading."

"This community wants to get on with it, but they are being tied up by red tape. There are so many opportunities, not just opals, but tourism, remote education, and more."



Subject: Formal Community Notice - Protection of Heritage Materials

Dear Mr Herdegen,

It has come to the attention of the Coober Pedy Community Alliance that the Council may be considering, or has received, an offer to dispose of aluminium materials forming part of the Coober Pedy community's historic building, originally retrieved from the Maralinga test site by the Coober Pedy Progress Association and community volunteers in 1976.

Our members discussed this matter at a recent meeting and expressed unanimous concern.

Given the lack of clear consultation with the community on matters affecting local heritage, we have resolved to take immediate steps to safeguard this important community asset.

The Coober Pedy Community Alliance is preparing to initiate a formal heritage preservation process to ensure that the integrity and historical significance of this structure, and all associated materials, are properly recognised and protected.

This process will be undertaken in good faith by the community to provide stability of purpose and continuity of care that extends beyond the term of the current Administration.

Accordingly, we respectfully request that the Council refrain from undertaking, approving, or permitting any removal, disposal, demolition, or alteration of the building or its components until appropriate consultation has occurred and the community's heritage interests have been duly considered.

Please note that we will also be seeking advice and assistance from relevant heritage and parliamentary representatives in support of this matter.

MEMORIAL: FIREFIGHTER GEOFF SQUIRES

21 November 1952 - 5 November 2025

This week in Coober Pedy we reflect on one of Coober Pedy's long term volunteer firefighter's Geoff Sykes who passed away suddenly on the 5th November 2025, overseas.

Matthew Corner former CFS Unit Captain offers a recap of Geoff's time in the CFS.

Geoff was a mentor for many Brigade Captains over the years, including myself. In February 2024, as Brigade Captain, I had the privilege of presenting Geoff with his National Service Medal, recognising his over 20 years of dedicated service with the Coober Pedy Brigade.

Geoff was a stubborn individual, but a highly skilled firefighter, mentor and reliable lieutenant, always willing to lend a hand during call outs and community events. Matt Corner.

On the 20th January 2024, Geoff Squires was awarded the Emergency Services NATIONAL MEDAL at a ceremony at the Coober Pedy CFS headquarters with 18 of Geoff's colleagues in attendance.

Previously, in 2014 Geoff was awarded his 10 year Service Medal. However, the National Medal is Australia's most awarded civilian medal. It recognises long and diligent service by members of recognised government and voluntary organisations that risk their lives or safety to protect or assist the community in enforcement of the law or in times of emergency or natural disaster.

This includes government organisations such as ambulance, correctional, emergency, fire and police forces, and voluntary organisations such as lifesaving or search and rescue groups.

In awarding the medal, Captain Matt Corner said that Geoff Squires was the longest, active serving member of the Coober Pedy CFS. Joining in in 2003, 20 years ago, Geoff had a demonstrated sense of reliability and hard work. "Geoff simply got in there and got the job done!

If something needs fixing, he will just get in there and fix it," said Unit Captain Matthew Corner.

"Geoff is one of our most experienced fire fighters having filled the roles of Lieutenant 1, Lieutenant 2, Senior Fire-Fighter. He is trained in HAZMAT, Breathing Apparatus, as well as fires at road crashes (MVA Motor Vehicle Accidents) with many more qualifications and experiences."

"At Coober Pedy Geoff worked as a qualified mechanic. He was also a long term local. He always put his hand up to participate in Community Engagement events and was a very reliable member when the pagers sounded for call outs."

"Along with attending many house fires over his time, Geoff also volunteered and travelled to both the Sydney bushfires and the Kangaroo Island fires."

"Locally he attended many dry lightning and other fires on the surrounding pastoral properties. There was one significant fire on Hamilton Station where the Unit spent the entire weekend fighting the fires."

"Hamilton Station is situated 114 km northeast of Oodnadatta on the Mount Dare Road," concluded Captain Matt Corner at the time.

Beginning as a CFS volunteer at Coober Pedy in 2003 Geoff had previously been a member at Crystal Brook and Wilmington Fire Units. At his presentation Geoff spoke of some of his experiences to the guests.

There were some years at Coober Pedy when membership was low and Geoff filled almost every role in responding to incidents, fires at road crashes (MVA Motor Vehicle Accidents)

Part of attending MVA's is the sad and tragic task of removing people from crashed vehicles. Geoff recall having to remove at least a dozen deceased people from various fires. "I have even rescued a Kangaroo from a house fire," said Geoff.

Geoff recalled some of the notable fires that he had attended. "Back at the time that Ian Gordon was the Unit Captain, we attended a clinic fire up on the APY Lands. That fire sustained \$3M worth of damage," said Geoff.

Along with attending many house fires over his time, Geoff also volunteered and travelled to the Sydney bushfires and the Kangaroo Island fires.

Region 4 is the largest of the six CFS Regions and covers 809,000 square kilometres (about 66%) of the State.

With a population of about 71,000 people, the Region takes in the Mid North, Flinders and North East and North West Pastoral areas.

Urgent action on climate change essential for human rights

Australian Human Rights Commission

The Australian Human Rights Commission is calling for urgent action from government and business to address the escalating impacts of climate change on Australians' human rights.

Launching its first major report on climate change, Human rights on a warming Earth, Commission President Hugh de Kretser said, 'The evidence on the extreme threat to humans posed by climate change is clear. By focussing on the human rights impact, we can focus on the action governments and business must take to protect current and future Australians.

'People's rights to life, health, housing, food and water are not luxuries. They are legal obligations that Australia has committed to uphold under international law. In the face of climate change, these rights are increasingly under threat.

The report outlines recommendations to government and industry, including:

- * urgently phasing out fossil fuels * ending subsidies for fossil fuel companies,
- * supporting workers affected by the transition to renewables.

President de Kretser emphasised the need for a more rapid shift away from fossil fuels, guided by human rights principles.

'Australian governments and businesses must act with greater urgency to protect our human rights from climate change. Central to this is cutting fossil fuel pollution and speeding up the transition to renewable

'The International Court of Justice in its recent landmark decision confirmed that nations have a legal duty to prevent significant harm to the climate system and could be liable for harm caused by continued fossil fuel production, consumption and subsidisation.'

The report also recommends that the Australian Government establish an Australian **Human Rights Act.**

'We need to protect Australians' human rights in law through a Human Rights Act. This is what the Australian Parliament's human rights committee recommended last year.

'A Human Rights Act would help to guide governments to make the right decisions on climate change. It would help to ensure the transition to renewables is just and fair. It would help to better plan, adapt and respond to more frequent and severe disasters,' President de Kretser said.

The report highlights the disproportionate impact of climate change on certain groups in Australia.

'Climate change will not affect people equally. Those who are already disadvantaged are more vulnerable to harm. People living in poverty, older people, people with a disability, First Peoples, children and rural communities will be hit harder.

'The pace at which we act will determine how dangerous the future is. If we want to protect our quality of life, we must address climate change with greater urgency,' President de Kretser said. Cocaine drivers put on notice



06 Nov 2025 South Australia Police will now be targeting people who consume cocaine and drive.

Commissioner of Police Grant Stevens said cocaine effects may last a short time but can be detected up to 24 hours after consumption.

"We know that consumption of cocaine can lead to overconfidence and aggression, reduced inhibition, increased risk-taking behaviours, agitation and loss of concentration, delusion, and affected vision, all traits you don't want in a person driving," Commissioner Stevens

"It is crucial that roadside drug testing includes cocaine to keep these dangerous drivers from our roads."

So far this year, drug driving contributed to eight people losing their lives, and 76 received life changing serious injuries. More than 2,600 drug drivers have received expiation notices.

This is compared to 2024, where drug driving was a factor in 14 of the lives lost on our roads and 129 lifechanging serious

A new road safety campaign to educate road users about the consequences of driving under the influence of cocaine will launch statewide.

"This new campaign highlights the overconfidence that taking cocaine induces, causing offenders to overlook the risk they pose to themselves and other road users," Commissioner Stevens said.

"The new drug test will reinforce our existing capabilities and become the new norm for our random drug testing campaigns, including the blitz operations conducted throughout the year," Commissioner Stevens said.

Severe penalties apply to drivers who commit drug driving offences including an immediate loss of licence along with the potential to immediately impound the vehicle.

The penalty is a \$875 fine, a \$102 victim of crime levy, a minimum of three months of disqualification, and four demerit points.

Refusing, or failing to comply to a random drug test is also an offence, incurring an immediate loss of licence, six demerit points, and a court imposed penalty with a minimum of 12 months disqualification.


- Ensure you have adequate food/water for the trip. Carry an extra supply for three to four days. In mild weather, each person needs six litres of water per day. In extreme weather, carry 10 litres of water per person per day.
- equipment, e.g. first aid kits, shovels, recovery straps and tools. If possible, take two spare tyres.
- Plan and identify fuel stops carefully. Your vehicle will use more fuel than normal driving.


- Provide a trip itinerary to relatives and friends. Have regular check-in times.
- Do not rely on mobile phone coverage. Carry a backup satellite phone or emergency position indicating radio beacon (EPIRB).
- Install the emergency+ or what3words apps which can help locate you. Note these may require mobile coverage.
- Learn to read from paper maps as a backup to GPS devices.

MECHANICAL

- Learn basic mechanical skills before going (e.g. change a tyre, check fluid levels, clean an air filter) and carry basic spare parts. Even if you do not know how to install them, another traveller might.
- Understand your vehicle's limitations and suitability for your route (2WD/4WD).
- Ensure your vehicle is in good mechanical order.
- In the event of a breakdown open your bonnet and STAY with your vehicle. This will make it easier to find you.





Blair Boyer: 3D printed guns to be banned in South Australia



The State Government will introduce a bill this week to ban the possession of blueprints to manufacture 3D printed guns – another step in the Malinauskas Labor Government's strong action to strengthen community safety.

It comes as a growing trend in the production of blueprints for 3D printed guns – files usually obtained online allowing people to make lethal weapons without serial numbers – continues. This growing threat is undermining the firearms licencing system and posing a serious threat to community safety.

The Firearms (Digital Blueprints for 3D Printing) Amendment Bill is a vital step to ensure the state's firearms legislation stays up to date with emerging technology. Those caught in unauthorised possession of blueprints to make 3D guns, could face imprisonment of up to 15 years and fines of up to \$75,000.

The Bill does not target the legitimate use of 3D printing technology. The Bill is purely focused on the unregulated and dangerous use of the technology to produce firearms illegally.

Consultation on the reforms took place with law enforcement, legal experts and community stakeholders as we work together to close the loophole for criminal activity.

The State Government's strong action since coming to government to make our community safer includes:

- * The toughest knife laws in the nation.
- * New laws to crack down on adults who recruit children to commit crime, with penalties of up to 15 years imprisonment.
- * Introduced legislation for strong new powers for police to respond to street gangs.
- * Record investment in SAPOL to prevent and respond to crime, including \$172 million for additional sworn police officers, \$12 million to accelerate police recruitment and \$31.1 million for essential infrastructure and equipment upgrades.

Blair Boyer MP Minister for Police said, "The Malinauskas Government is committed to community safety with these measures responsible and necessary to ensure we keep up to date with emerging technology.

Our top priority is to keep South Australians safe, and this new legislation is the perfect example of how we take action when it is needed. There will always be deceitful people who seek to work outside of the law and this is us acting as quickly as possible to ensure any loopholes are closed, and that police have the powers they need when these issues arise.

For 10 consecutive months, South Australia's crime rate has reduced. The new laws and extra investment in SAPOL we have made since coming to government are working and we will continue to do what is necessary to keep the community safe.

Real consequences for serious repeat young offenders

The Government is moving to better protect the community from serious repeat young offenders, with tough new provisions set to be introduced into State Parliament.

The reforms have been developed as part of the Government's **Young Offenders Plan**, and aim to give authorities better power to deal with young offenders who repeatedly break the law.

The reforms tighten the provisions targeted at youths who repeatedly commit serious offences, to better identify and manage repeat young offenders, with tougher sentences applying to them. This will mean young people declared as serious young offenders will need to spend at least four fifths of any sentence in detention. These declarations will occur automatically, rather than at the court's discretion.

The changes would also introduce a presumption against bail for serious repeat young offenders when they are arrested for a new, serious offence.

As part of the Young Offenders Plan, the Government is investing \$3 million over 3 years from the Justice Rehabilitation Fund (JRF) for targeted intervention programs to break the cycle for young people most at risk of repeat offending.

The Department of Human Services is leading the development of these individualised and clinically-informed programs.

Kyam Maher MLC said, "While we have one of the lowest young offender rates in the nation, there's no room for complacency.

Our Young Offenders Plan is providing more ways to rehabilitate young offenders where possible, while ensuring all appropriate measures are available in those cases where community safety is being put at risk.

Identifying those young offenders who repeatedly engage in serious offending is an important step in ensuring any response through the courts is appropriate and recognises the importance of protecting the community.

Tightening up these measures will ensure repeat offenders are subject to tougher sentencing and – in the event they face further serious charges – will face a presumption against bail while their matter progresses through the courts.

These are considered, sensible reforms that will help better protect the community."


