OPEN LETTER TO CEO GARRY HERDEGEN
 Subject: Request for Review Under Section 270 – Rate Increases and Financial Accountability

Dear Mr. Herdegen,

On behalf of 183 members of the Cooper Pedy Community Alliance, we formally request a review pursuant to Section 270 of the Local Government Act 1999 (SA) in relation to recent and proposed rate increases affecting the Cooper Pedy community.

Councils are empowered under the Local Government Act 1999 (SA) to raise revenue through rates to deliver essential services, maintain infrastructure, and ensure long-term financial sustainability. However, this authority must be exercised with a high degree of transparency, accountability, and responsible financial management, particularly in a community as unique and economically sensitive as Cooper Pedy.

In the case of Cooper Pedy, the use of rate increases to address ongoing financial pressures raises serious and legitimate concerns within the community. While councils may lawfully adjust rates to meet budgetary requirements, doing so without clearly identifying and addressing the root causes of financial instability risks placing an unfair and disproportionate burden on residents and local businesses.

Cooper Pedy is not a typical municipality. Its remote location, fluctuating population, and economic reliance on mining and tourism mean that many ratepayers already operate under significant financial constraints. In this context, rate increases, especially substantial ones, cannot be justified as a default solution to financial shortfalls, particularly where those shortfalls may be linked to past decisions, governance issues, or inadequate financial oversight.

Accordingly, we submit that ratepayers in Cooper Pedy should not be expected to absorb the consequences of financial mismanagement without:

1. Full and transparent disclosure of the factors contributing to the council's financial position
2. Clear identification of any past decisions or practices that have led to the current situation
3. Demonstrated evidence that cost-saving measures, efficiencies, and alternative solutions have been properly explored
4. Genuine accountability for financial decision-making at both administrative and governance levels
5. A fair, accessible, and clearly communicated right to review or appeal rate increases

Without these safeguards, the imposition of higher rates risks being perceived not as responsible governance, but as a mechanism to offset financial mismanagement at the direct expense of the community. This undermines public trust and is inconsistent with both the intent and the principles of the Local Government Act 1999.

For Cooper Pedy, where economic resilience is already fragile, the stakes are significantly higher. Rate-setting must be approached with heightened care, meaningful community consultation, and enforceable accountability measures. Anything less risks long-term damage to both the community's financial well-being and confidence in local governance.

REQUEST FOR REVIEW

Pursuant to Section 270, we formally request that the Council:

1. Initiate a review of the processes, decisions, and financial considerations underpinning recent and proposed rate increases;
2. Provide full transparency regarding the council's financial position and the drivers of any budgetary shortfalls;
3. Assess whether appropriate governance, financial management, and consultation obligations have been met;
4. Identify and implement corrective measures where deficiencies are found;
5. Ensure that a clear and accessible mechanism exists for ratepayers to seek review or appeal of rate decisions.
6. 2018-2019, the DCCP total debt reached roughly \$9–10 million. What is the Current debt in 2026 under administration?

We request that this review be conducted transparently and that its findings be made publicly available to the Cooper Pedy community.

We look forward to your formal response and to constructive engagement on this matter.

FOSSICKING FOR OPAL

The Rules

Fossicking Definition

Fossicking means the gathering of precious stones (opal) as a recreation, or without the intention to sell the stones or to utilise them for a commercial or industrial purpose. Note: Does not include gathering precious stones through disturbance of land by machinery or explosives.

Opal Fields are no place for children!



Dangers are everywhere, a child's safety will be placed at risk!

- Open mine shafts / exploration drill holes,
 - Unstable ground, undercut shaft edges and deep trenches,
 - Explosions,
 - Mobile plant and operating machinery, and
 - Snakes and insects.
- Falling into a mine shaft, deep trench or open cut pit, can will sustain serious injuries or death!
- Personal Protective Equipment and Supplies
 It can reach temperatures of up to 50 degrees during summer months, and the following is recommended:
- Apply 50+ rating sunscreen to protect exposed skin from the sun's UV radiation,
 - Wear a broadbrim hat, strong lightweight clothing, gloves and enclosed footwear, and
 - Wear a P2 Dust mask / respirator when generating dust to prevent possible exposure to respirable crystalline silica.
 - Carry enough cool drinking water and fuel for the trip.
- Note: Camping is illegal on South Australian opal fields!

Communications

- When fossicking alone:
- Tell someone where (location) you are going,
 - Have communications (phone, two way radio etc...) to regularly check in, and
 - Ensure your contact person knows what to do if you don't check in!



Accessing Opal Fields - Know your Location!



- Use a GPS, compass, or take pictures of locations or ground markings to ensure you know the right way out of the areas,
 - Recommend having a 3m flexible flag (orange) or an amber flashing light to make vehicle visible, and
 - Drive slow, look for traffic and drive to conditions,
- Note: Mine shafts are everywhere, keep eyes open!

Hidden Dangers!

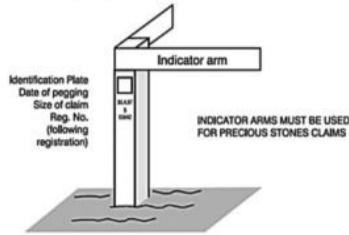


Look where you place your feet, and never walk backwards!

Mine shafts can be covered with sheets of corrugated iron or thin metal mesh, spinifex, mullock heap spoil and other materials which can hide the dangers. Stepping on these areas, can result in the material / ground collapsing, and a person falling down a mine shaft. It is recommended to:

- Use a thin long steel rod or piece of wood to test the ground in front of you when walking around the base of a heap.
- Listening for metal on metal type sounds when tapping / pushing into the material, is a good way to identify these hazards.

Identifying a Registered Claim



- A registered claim can be identified by:
- A post on each corner of the claim with a permit number attached to the post.
 - Each posts must be at least 70 mm thick and stand at least 0.750 mm above the surface of the ground.
 - Posts must be knocked securely into the ground and have indicator arms on the outer sides of the post to show the direction and clearly identify the claim boundary.

It is an offence for fossickers to enter or remain on land comprised in a claim without obtaining the permission of the owner of the claim

Dangerous Ground

Dangerous ground is an area of ground (mine shafts, tunnels, open pits, faces etc...) that has been deemed unsafe to access, fossick or mine by the Department for Energy and Mining, because it has either collapsed, or has the potential to collapse. Dangerous ground can be identified by a "Danger - Unsafe Ground, No Mining Permitted" sign, or by Red Post Markers knocked into the ground. Accessing or mining dangerous ground is prohibited without approval from SafeWork SA.



Identifying Unsafe Ground

- Signs of potentially unsafe ground conditions are, but not limited to:
- Sunken ground, cracked / split ground,
 - Open voids, and
 - Weathered / eroded shaft edges

Fossicking

Fossickers are warned against entering old open cut and underground workings as many dangers may exist!



- Fossicking can only take place to a maximum depth of 1 metre,
 - All holes must be refilled,
 - Unstable ground, stale air and lack of oxygen,
 - Unprotected openings and water filled holes,
 - Fossicking into sides of excavations may cause a cave in,
 - Large stockpiles may collapse unexpectedly if undercut.
- Note: Seek assistance of experienced and competent miners to assist before entering old mines!

Caldwell Drill Holes and Exploration holes

Do not stand too close to an edge of a mine shaft! Rains can erode and undercut the ground around the top edge of a mine shaft, whilst still giving the appearance of solid ground. When weight is placed on the ground around the edge of the shaft, the ground can give away and collapse!

Mullock Heaps



Mullock heaps are mounds of material that have been dug from a mine shaft and underground, and are generally known as waste material, and can be very slippery to climb.

Mine shafts are located at the bases of a heaps. When climbing, a loss of footing could result in a person sliding to the bottom of the heap, into a mine shaft resulting in serious injury or death.

Always climb a heap on the opposite side to a mine shaft opening, and always take a bucket of material from a heap and search though it on stable, safe ground.

Opal Mining Act 1995

Part 3—Precious stones tenements

25—Unlawful entry on tenement

(1) A person must not, without lawful authority or excuse, enter or remain on land comprised in a registered precious stones tenement without first obtaining the permission of the holder of the tenement.



Maximum Penalty:

\$10,000.

FIRST AID & EMERGENCY

Be prepared for minor first aid injuries or emergency situations while fossicking in the opal fields.

Snakes are all too common in these areas, they can be found in shafts and holes, or curled up under a bush or a piece of tin.

The "inland taipan" and the "brown snake" are extremely poisonous and will attack if they feel threatened.

Ensure your first aid kit has a snake bite kit in it and familiarise with the requirements for first aid treatment of a snake bite.

It is recommended at a minimum, that the following is carried in a vehicle at all times whilst in the opal fields:

- A small first aid kit, and snake bite kit, and
 - List of emergency contact numbers

COMMUNITY REJECTS AEC PROPOSED CHANGES TO GREY

The people of Grey, councils, and relevant stakeholders have delivered a rejection of the Australian Electoral Commission's (AEC) proposed changes to the electorate, with figures formed using publicly available AEC submissions revealing near-unanimous community opposition.

The data shows that 97.93% of public respondents and 100% of local government submissions formally opposed the AEC's plan to expand the regional electorate's boundaries into outer-metropolitan areas. The community has made it clear that Grey is already vast enough, and the incorporation of metropolitan suburbs would dilute the voices, economies, and unique priorities of rural, regional, and remote South Australians.

This community pushback is backed by enrolment data, which indicates the boundary expansion is not required. While the AEC projected Grey would reach 132,595 electors by 2030, actual enrolment as of April 2026 has already hit 130,852. The electorate is projected to surpass the AEC's projections before June 2027 and organically reach over 137,000 electors by the end of the decade, satisfying requirements without absorbing outer metropolitan populations.

The proposed renaming of the Federation-era electorate was similarly rejected by the community, with 75.18% of public respondents and 77.78% of local councils against the change due to the loss of established identity and financial transition costs. Crucially, while many constituents, and current Federal Member for Grey Tom Venning, expressed profound respect for the legacy of Dr Lowitja O'Donoghue, the overarching consensus is that her contributions should be honoured in other ways, rather than by undertaking an expensive electorate rebrand and overwriting a century of local history.

Data Summary:

- The AEC received 415 submissions in relation to South Australia's redistribution:
 - o Of the 241 submissions addressing the proposed redistribution of Grey, 236 opposed and 5 supported the proposal (97.93% opposed). Of the 282 submissions addressing the proposed renaming of Grey, 212 opposed and 70 supported the proposal (75.18% opposed).
 - o The AEC received 11 submissions from local governments regarding the proposed redistribution and renaming of Grey. Of the 11 submissions addressing the proposed redistribution of Grey, 11 opposed and 0 supported the proposal (100% opposed). Of the 9 submissions addressing the proposed renaming of Grey, 7 opposed and 2 supported the proposal (77.78% opposed).
- AEC Projections Query: Current enrolment of 130,852 is on track to surpass the AEC's 2030 projection of 132,595 before June 2027.

SAPOL HITS MAJOR WORKFORCE MILESTONE

South Australia has its full complement of police officers for the first time in nearly a decade, as the State Government launches a new recruitment ad campaign to boost the state's police force even further.

South Australia Police will reach the authorised Police Establishment level this week, following record investment in police establishing South Australia as having the highest number of sworn police per capita of any state. This marks a significant improvement from September 2023, when the shortfall stood at 227 FTEs

The State Government is investing an additional \$172 million over six years to further grow our police force to 5,000 - adding an additional 326 sworn officers.

This is in addition to an extra \$29 million invested to recruit an extra 98 Police Security Officers (PSOs). PSOs perform roles currently undertaken by sworn officers and the additional hires enables sworn officers to be redirected back to frontline operations.

On Wednesday 5/5/2026, 28 international police officers were sworn in with a further 22 local cadets being sworn in on Thursday taking South Australia's frontline policing capability to 4,674.2 strong

This is a major milestone and follows a massive recruitment drive by SAPOL with the support of the State Government over the past three years. It strengthens frontline policing capacity and visibility across metropolitan and regional South Australia to enhance overall community safety.

New officers have joined SAPOL from the United Kingdom, New Zealand, and Canada.

The State Government's determination to boost our police force is being further strengthened with the launch of a new ad as part of SAPOL's refreshed campaign Career Search: Find Where You Belong in Blue to let more people know about the benefits of a career with SA Police.

16/04/2026 – At about 4.00pm on Thursday 16th April 2026, police responded to a reported theft after a male had stole a donation tin from the counter of a store on Hutchison Street. Police have arrested a 40 year old male from the States Far North who was charged with theft and will face court at a later date.

Police investigate Coober Pedy crime series. Police have arrested a youth following an investigation into a series of break-ins and thefts from businesses in Coober Pedy.

18/04/2026 - About 3.30am a business on Hutchison Street was broken into and a Toyota Landcruiser was stolen. On the same night, the stolen Landcruiser was used to break through a fence and gain entry to a business on Umoona Road where two Toyota Hilux's were stolen. Patrols responded and located the Hilux and Landcruiser on Hutchinson Street, and the second Hilux was located on Burke Street.

Following investigations, a 13-year-old boy from Port Augusta, was arrested and charged with serious criminal trespass, theft and driving without a licence. He was refused police bail and appeared in the Adelaide Youth Court yesterday. CO26000166539

20/04/2026 Police are also investigating a break-in that occurred about 2am at a business on Hutchinson Street, Coober Pedy. A white Toyota Hilux, a grey Toyota Kluger, a white Ford Ranger and a white Isuzu truck were stolen. The vehicles were seen driving in the Coober Pedy area in an un-safe manner however were later recovered by police on Ward Street, Coober Pedy.

22/04/2026 just after midnight a business on Seventeen Mile Road at Coober Pedy was broken into and a white Toyota Hilux was stolen. (now recovered) The vehicle was sighted at an incident on Van Brugge Street where the occupants caused damage to numerous vehicles.

Investigations are continuing and police believe the break-ins and thefts to be linked to the same group of suspects. GROWING UP UNDERGROUND: A PHOTOGRAPHER'S JOURNEY INTO COOBER PEDY'S CULTURE

For more than two decades, Sunshine Coast photographer Matt O'Brien has built a career capturing moments of movement, culture and everyday life across the globe. His work has taken him through the worlds of surf, sport, travel and street photography, shooting for major brands and magazines throughout Australia, Asia, Europe and the United States, including campaigns for Red Bull and Billabong.

Along the way, Matt's photography has appeared on twelve magazine covers, while his documentary work has carried him into places far removed from the commercial world, including Syria in 2010, shortly before the outbreak of war.

Now based on Queensland's Sunshine Coast, O'Brien runs a café and gallery called TOME in Maroochydore, while also working as a painter, a practical shift brought on when rising costs and inflation forced many creative pursuits onto the back burner.



But photography, he says, has remained the work he truly cares about, and that passion is drawing him toward a new long-term documentary project in Coober Pedy.

The project, titled Youth Underground, aims to document the lives of young people and families living in the town's famous dugouts.

While Coober Pedy has long fascinated photographers and filmmakers, O'Brien believes much of the attention has traditionally focused on the older generations, miners, long-time locals and the rugged outback landscape itself.

What interests him instead is what it means to grow up underground.

From teenagers carving out their own spaces in sandstone bedrooms, to young couples building homes beneath the earth, to children sleeping underground while summer temperatures soar above 45 degrees, O'Brien wants to capture the quieter realities of daily life rarely seen by outsiders.

Equally important to the project is the connection between home and work. O'Brien says the story of youth in Coober Pedy cannot be separated from the industries that shape the town. He hopes to document the rhythms of families whose lives move between the dugout and the workplace, whether at the Desalination Plant, the Power Station, on the Opal Fields, or across generations working side by side in the same local industries.

Rather than arriving with a fixed narrative, O'Brien describes the project as an open-ended exploration shaped by the people he meets along the way.

"Some of the best photographs come from the moments you never planned for," he says.

Fatherhood has also changed the way he sees the world through a camera. Watching his own children grow up has made him increasingly drawn to the small, ordinary moments that often become the most meaningful with time, breakfast before school, quiet evenings at home, preparing for work, family routines and the everyday details that define a life.

He believes young people in Coober Pedy are experiencing the same universal moments as families anywhere else in Australia, only against the extraordinary backdrop of underground living.

The project will unfold over multiple visits across 2026 and 2027, with O'Brien's first foundation trip scheduled for May 15 to 22. During that time, he hopes to connect with families and young people willing to share a glimpse into their daily lives.

His approach, he says, is slow, respectful and entirely collaborative, focused not on staged images, but on authentic moments as they naturally happen.

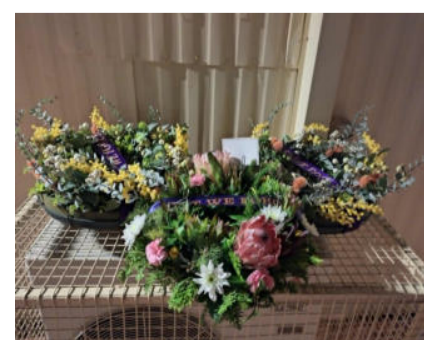

AUSTRALIAN BIGGEST SHEEP STATION AGGREGATION - IS FOR SALE, JUST SOUTH OF COOBER PEDY

Elders Ltd (ASX: ELD) has been appointed by Jumbuck Pastoral to undertake the divestment of a contiguous aggregation of three pastoral stations spanning 1,289,700 hectares.

The aggregation is an iconic powerhouse of wool and sheep meat production, having the prescribed capacity to carry over 83,300 sheep. It is located in a core sheep-producing district of South Australia's Far North pastoral zone, supporting large-scale, low-input merino enterprises with demonstrated long-term resilience and strategic highway access. The aggregation is comprised of the following stations:

- Commonwealth Hill: 553,100 hectares
- Mobella: 426,600 hectares
- Bulgunnia: 310,000 hectares

The aggregation will be offered as a whole and in parts on a walk in walk out basis, including a significant merino sheep flock.

"This represents a rare opportunity to acquire Australia's largest contiguous sheep station aggregation during a period of unprecedented growth in demand for quality Australian fibre and protein," said Elders Real Estate CEO, Tom Russo.

"These assets offer exposure to globally relevant production. Global sheep meat export volumes have grown faster than overall production over the last decade, resulting in rising reliance on international trade and reinforcing Australia's role as a key exporter."

Investing now to participate in the response to this ever growing demand is a compelling opportunity, especially when it is anchored by quality and finite real assets."

The aggregation is being offered to the market in the context of excellent seasonal and market conditions. The country is well managed and has benefited from recent favorable seasonal conditions, currently offering an abundance of feed.

The Australian wool market is in its strongest position for many years and current low inventory and stronger processor demand suggests that the market can hold materially above long term averages moving forward. In addition, sheep meat prices remain historically strong at near record levels.

The aggregation spans an area that is larger than more than forty sovereign nations around the world.

"Given the strategic advantages and efficiencies that can be achieved by operating an enterprise at this scale, we anticipate receiving offers from both large private and corporate investors within Australia and internationally.

Having said that, we will be running a flexible expression of interest process that will accommodate bids on single stations or the entire aggregation, thereby providing the opportunity for a large range of interested parties to participate in the process."

Jumbuck Pastoral is one of the largest livestock production enterprises in Australia. Established in 1888, it is owned by the MacLachlan family and has vast pastoral land holdings throughout the country. The aggregation has been held by Jumbuck since the 1940's and the sale is being undertaken as part of an orderly succession planning process being conducted by the family.

"The portfolio of pastoral assets that has been acquired by Jumbuck nationally over many years of sustained investment is truly extraordinary", said Mr Russo. "The decision to divest some of that portfolio is clearly one that is not taken lightly in the context of such a storied and much admired dynasty. That said, the time has come to undertake this restructure and set the platform for the next chapter of that story." The sale process will commence in mid May.

CFS AWARDS FIREFIGHTER OF THE YEAR

Receiving the Firefighter of the Year 2025 award came as a complete surprise for the local firefighter Brad Porter, who said he felt both humbled and honoured by the recognition.

Having only been involved with the fire service for one year and five months, he admitted the award was something he hadn't expected. "It didn't even cross my mind," he said.

For Brad, the honour represents more than just individual recognition. It reflects the support and respect of fellow brigade members and the wider CFS family.

Brad said the award made him feel valued by both the CFS and his team-mates, while reinforcing that his efforts and commitment to the role had mattered.

His journey into firefighting began with a simple but powerful desire, to become involved in something meaningful while helping the community and building long-term friendships.

"Serving the Coober Pedy community is something we all take great pride in. I'm happy to help because I'm part of this community," he said.

While the role comes with many challenges, learning new skills has been one of the most demanding aspects of the job. However, Brad praised the ongoing professional support provided by CFS trainers, staff and fellow brigade members, saying the encouragement from the team had made a significant difference.

Brad said one of the things he enjoyed most about the role is the constant challenge and opportunity to keep learning.

Although every call-out is different, he explained that each incident leaves a lasting impression in its own way.

"All the incidents I have attended have unique differences that make them memorable," he said.

When asked what makes a good firefighter, Brad said commitment, teamwork and supporting fellow members are the essential ingredients.

"To me, a firefighter should give their all at every incident and training session, both practical and theory, while always trying to apply their best," he said.

"Supporting your team members both on the job and back at the station is also very important." Teamwork within the brigade, he explained, is critical, particularly in a small regional community where everyone must work together and rely on one another.

"With smaller numbers, everyone has to pitch in and help with the workload," he said.

"We also need to trust and rely on each other so we can perform our duties safely and look out for one another while getting the job done."

Brad also highlighted the close working relationship between the brigade and other emergency services, saying many people may not realise firefighters regularly work alongside SAAS and the Coober Pedy Mine Rescue/SES during incidents.

Behind the scenes, he credited much of his success to the support of his partner, Bear, as well as the camaraderie shared within the brigade.

"I'd like to thank my partner Bear for being my biggest supporter, and my brigade for their camaraderie," he said.

Looking to the future, Brad hopes to see more local people step forward to join the brigade and help strengthen emergency services within the community.

For young people considering joining the CFS or MFS, their advice was simple:

"Stop procrastinating, just do it!"

Despite being relatively new to the role, his passion for firefighting and helping the Coober Pedy community remains the driving force behind his dedication.

Outside of firefighting, Brad enjoys spending quality time with Bear and their pets, as well as motorbike riding.

The Firefighter of the Year award serves as a reminder of the important role local volunteers and emergency service workers play in protecting and supporting regional communities every day.

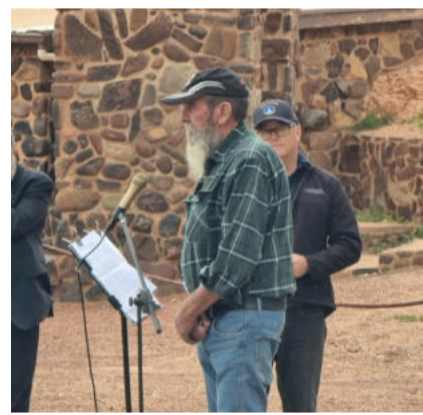
